Can I apply? Admission requirements

*For Trimester 1, 2024 the bulk of offers were made to applicants via the Portfolio and Interview pathway, with limited top-up offers made to applicants with a minimum adjusted ATAR/Rank of 90.00. Minimum thresholds can change from year to year and should be used as a guide only for any future intakes. Applicants with VET qualifications may not be offered a place if the lowest selection rank is higher than the equivalent rank for the VET qualification.

How to apply

Admission to the Bachelor of Film and Screen Media Production is via portfolio and interview. Limited offers may be made in later rounds via ATAR/rank should places remain.

To be considered via the Portfolio pathway applicants must apply to QTAC (or via Internal Transfer for current Griffith University students), pay the portfolio fee and submit their portfolio to Griffith University.

Portfolio application for study in 2025 is open 1 August 2024 and closes 4 September 2024.

Please note that the number of days can vary depending on when the offer was made. This requirement applies to all applicants irrespective of how you applied and/or whether you accepted conditionally or unconditionally. If you do not enrol* into at least one class for your program by 5pm on the response day your offer will lapse. Lapsed offers are not automatically reinstated and are subject to available places.

*Enrolling into classes means that you are advising when you are attending class/es. Enrolment must be submitted.

What are the language requirements? Language requirements

English language requirements apply to International applicants and other applicants whose previous study was undertaken in a language other than English. The minimum English language requirements for such applicants for entry to this program are as follows:

- A minimum overall band score of 6.5 on IELTS (Academic) with no sub-score of less than 6.0
- OR a minimum score of 575 on TOEFL
- OR an internet-based (iBT) TOEFL score of 79 (no sub-score less than 19)
- *OR* no score less than 3+ in each skill of the ISLPR (conducted by ISLPR Language Services only)
- *OR* a minimum overall score of 176 (no score less than 169) on C1 Advanced (formerly Cambridge Certificate in Advanced English) or C2 Proficiency (formerly Cambridge Certificate of Proficiency in English)
- OR an overall score of 58 in the Pearson Test of English (Academic) with no score less than 50.

English test results must be no more than two years old.

requirements for this Griffith degree.
